Background:

A new study by University of California economists finds that the Los Angeles living wage ordinance has raised pay for nearly 10,000 jobs – with minimal employment loss. Nearly 70 percent of workers affected by the law are low-income and only 4 percent are teenagers, according to the report, which was funded in part by the Ford Foundation.

The Living Wage Ordinance was approved unanimously by the Los Angeles City Council in 1997 after a strong showing of community support. At the time, opponents argued that the ordinance would eliminate thousands of jobs. Councilmembers Padilla and Reyes will discuss how this report will impact deliberations on similar issues in the future.
